

Community Council Meeting Minutes

August 17, 2022

Due to a new principal change at Majestic Fields Elementary, an amendment was made to the current school plan.

The amendment was agreed upon by each Community Council member. The next step includes submitting the plan to the District Office and then approval by the local school board.
